It becomes the painful duty of THE REFLECTOR this week to record the death of one of our old and highly respected citizens, Mrs. George Shetler, Sr., at her home, No. 112 north Center street. She leaves a husband and four children to mourn the loss of the dearest one on earth—MOTHER. The following brief obituary will be of interest to all her friends and relatives:

Mrs. Martha A., wife of Mr. Geo. Shetler, died Monday, September 13th, at 9-10 a. m., of heart disease. She was born in St. Clairsville, Ohio, December 5th, 1813, being at the time of her death 72 years, 9 months and 7 days of age. She was married to Mr. Geo. Mr. Pratt officiated and the choir rendered two beautiful pieces, one a favorite of deceased, "Come, Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove," the other selected by the family, "I'm Watching and Waiting for Thee."
