SOME HISTORICAL NOTES ON THE REMOTE PAST

The county of Yorkshire in England was the home of the Horner (or Hornor) family for centuries prior to the discovery of America, and, as the following quotation will show, was the only locality in England where the named appeared in very early times. In this locale, according to Wm. S. Hornor, author of "This Old Monmouth of Ours", the name was spelled both Hornor and Horner before any migration to America took place.

The "Ripon Millinery Record", a tome which was published in 1886 to commemorate the one thousandth anniversary of the founding of that city, mentions the name Horner as one of those names which derive from an occupation, but does not specify just what that occupation was. Some support is given to the theory that the first Horners used a horn in the discharge of some official function by the design of a shield which is supposed to have commemorated the activities of members of that family.

The shield which embellishes the cover of this genealogical sketch is in accord with that design. The original shields are or were to be found in St. John's Church and the Town Hall in the city of York.

Further historical data are included in a quotation from page 22, Part II of the Ripon Millinery Record and reads as follows:

"William Horner was the first of his name recorded as Wakeman, and afterwards his descendants filled that office more frequently than members of any other family. The Horners are one of the most ancient families in Yorkshire; they came to Ripon from Nidderdale, where they have lived as substantial free-men from time immemorial, many of them holding lands of free tenure under the Abbey of Fountains. (Walbran's Memorials of Fountains Abbey). Upon the dissolution of the monasteries the Horners, who, according to Grainge, the author of the **History of Nidderdale**,

held the best social position in that valley, were much reduced in substance and importance, and many of them took up their abode in the City of Ripon, where they followed various reputable callings, and attained very frequently the chief magistracy and other municipal offices. The family hold a tradition (unfortunately not corroborated by the public record) that the earliest Wakeman of Ripon was a Horner, and that in recognition of this circumstance the city's armorial horn was adopted from that Wakeman's family shield (Argent three bugle horns sable, garnished or). They may or may not be as true as the majority of family traditions. Nevertheless, the history of Ripon affords at least some reason for such a supposition. Grainge's **Nidderdale** states that "Woodale, situated on the north side of Stonebeck Up was the original home, and for a long time the seat of the family Horner, members of which have held a considerable estate, and have, at different times, been very liberal benefactors to the township (middlesmoor) . . . At beginning of the 18th century, this family held land in seven different parts of the dale." The lands of Nidderdale have gradually passed away from the Horners, but members of the family still live in that dale and the adjacent ones of Coverdale and Wensleydale. It is a curious fact that whilst the Horners of Yorkshire were so closely connected with the Abbey of Fountains, John Horner was Steward of the Monastic House of Glastonbury. With the exception of this man, no Horners were known outside of Yorkshire, and it appears highly probable that either he or his ancestor passed from Fountains to Glastonbury Abbey — possibly as the bearer of some monastic communication — and finding the land to be a goodly one, remained there and established a family. This John Horner — afterwards Sir John Horner — was the founder of the Somerset Horners, still seated at Mells, in that county. The manner in which he gained his estate gave rise to the well-known nursery rhyme of **Little Jack Horner**. He was sent (so tradition tells) to London with the title-deeds of the abbey lands concealed in a pie; feeling hungry

on the way and attacking the pie, he discovered the deeds, and succeeded in getting them vested in himself (O tempora, O mores!) The plum which that sagacious youth secured being the estate in question, the exultant expressions of self-satisfaction embodied in the last line of the nursery rhyme may be well understood!

From this family are descended the Earls of Ilchester — the last Lord Ilchester was Richard Horner. The Horners appear to have been successful candidates for municipal honours in the two oldest cities in Yorkshire, for Christopher Horner was Sheriff of York in 1512, Robert Horner was Sheriff in 1636 and twice Lord Mayor (1648 & 1658), having been Sheriff in 1658. The shields (arg. 3 bugle-horns sa), in St. John's Church and the Town Hall, York, probably commemorate these Horners."

FOREWORD

As John S. Hornor makes plain, the "Historical Sketch of the Hornor Family Since 1683" is intended to link the past to the future. In reprinting and incorporating it in an outline of the generations which have followed him it is probably serving as he had hoped. Obviously he was interested in the family history and may have wished to foster interest and a modest pride in those who follow him as members of a family whose years in America have been long.

Another example of his desire to link the past to the future is found in the carvings which adorn the central monument that marks the Hornor burial plot in Maple Hill Cemetery in Helena. The four faces of this monument are marked as follows:

Here he ties, in an enduring manner, the generation which preceeds his own to that of his children. **Three generations on one stone.** In my limited experience, unusual, and, almost certainly, an invitation to the future to identify itself with the past.

While the "Historical Sketch" served to trace the descent of the "Arkansas" Hornors from the Quaker immigrant, John Hornor, who settled in New Jersey in 1683, it is by no means as complete as the study of the family made by William S. Hornor which appears in his book "This Old

Monmouth of Ours", published in 1932 by Moreau Bros. of Freehold, N. J.

In the outline of the Hornor family which follows, a numbering system similar to that William S. Hornor employed in his book is used, but it is not keyed into his genealogy of the family. In the "Hornor Family in Arkansas" John Sidney Hornor bears the number "1" merely because, so far as I know, all the Hornors who now reside and for some years past have resided in Arkansas are his direct descendants. Logically, William B. R. Hornor should be designated by the number "1", but it appears that he left no direct descendants who now live in Arkansas. His sister, Amelia R., however, does have some direct Arkansas descendants, among whom are the Sanfords and the family of Mrs. Johnny Porter Stephens Schatz.

Anyone who wishes to tie the descendants of John S. & Elizabeth Hornor to the family as shown in "This Old Monmouth of Ours" has merely to assign John S. Hornor the number "195", which is the number William S. Hornor gave him in that book.

The pages which follow are not the result of great painstaking research, but, I believe, any discrepancies which may be discovered will be minor and would not, to any great extent, affect the overall picture of the family as presented here.

The assembly of the data on living members of the family is chiefly the work of various lady members at the suggestion of Mrs. Joseph A. Hornor some years ago.

The purpose of "The Hornor Family in Arkansas" is to bridge the gap from the days of John S. Hornor to the present.

If it supplies that bridge, and, as an added bonus, inspires some one in the future to carry the story forward a few chapters, it will have been worth whatever effort it has cost.

HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE HORNOR FAMILY SINCE 1683

On the First of November, 1683, the good ship Providence, Capt. Robert Hopper, from New Castle, England, cast anchor at the town of Burlington, New Jersey. Among the passengers were John Hornor, Mary, his wife, and their ten children—the youngest of them a little more than five years old.

John Hornor was a man of culture and means, and selected a tract of land, then partially improved, on a beautiful eminence commanding noble views of the Delaware, near Whitehall,¹ one mile south of the present town of Bordentown, in the State of New Jersey. He was buried near his own house in his own burying ground on the 25th of February, 1699². The old Hornor burying ground is still preserved there. The eldest son of John Hornor bore his father's name, but, dying childless, left his estate to his youngest brother, Isaac, entailed to his (Isaac's) oldest son, who was John Hornor, the third of the name.

Isaac Hornor, son of John and Mary, was the youngest of ten children, was born at Todcaster, Yorkshire, England, in 1678, and was in his sixth year when he accompanied his parents to America. He was twice married. First to Elizabeth Sykes at Chesterfield, New Jersey. Their children were Rachel and Elizabeth. Isaac Hornor was married a second time to Eleanor Boune,³ daughter of Samuel Boune.³ Their children were:

John — born 1719; died 1753

Mary — born 1721; died 1776

Samuel — born March 1, 1724; died 1766

Joseph — born 1726; died —

Elizabeth — born 1729; died 1766

Isaac — born 1732; died 1822

Benjamin and Amy — born 1737; died 1807 and 1823.

Samuel Hornor, son of Isaac Hornor and Eleanor Boune³ Hornor, was married to Mary Leonard, at Trenton, New Jersey, in 1740.⁴ Their children were:

John — born October 27, 1750; died 1819

Amy — born January 10, 1754

Samuel — born March 17, 1756

Sarah — born July 27, 1757

Joseph — January 30, 1763

Samuel, the father of the last named children, died in 1766.

John Hornor, (the fourth of the name), son of Samuel and Mary Leonard Hornor, was married to Patty Richards, daughter of John Richards, of Falmouth, Virginia, July 27, 1777. Their children were:

Mary L. — born January 21, 1781

Amelia R. — born July 8, 1783

Patty Richards Hornor died near Helena, Arkansas, November 13, 1831.

John Hornor, (the fifth of the name), son of John and Patty Richards Hornor, was married to Judith M. Roy, daughter of Thomas Roy, of Fauquier county, Virginia. Their children were:

John Sidney — born August 24, 1806

Catharine M. R. — born March 19, 1809; died May 18, 1883

Thomas A. — born January 27, 1811; died March 12, 1878

Richard Henry — born October 22, 1813; died July 23, 1815

William A. — born February 25, 1819

Patsey — born April 17, 1822; died May 9, 1860

John, the father of the above named children, died as above stated, March 16, 1848 and Judith M. Roy Hornor, the mother, died December 31, 1857, and are both buried at Broad Run Church, Harrison County, West Virginia.

John Sidney Hornor, son of John and Judith M. Roy Hornor, was married October 1, 1829, to Elizabeth Johnson, daughter of Joseph Johnson, of Bridgeport, Virginia, who was for many years a member of Congress, and afterwards governor of the State of Virginia for four years. The children of John S. and Elizabeth Hornor were:

Albert A. — born March 6, 1831

John Joseph — born March 21, 1833

Virginia — born March 27, 1835; died August 14, 1837

Mary — born August 20, 1838

Hamilton S. — born July 22, 1844

Sidney Henry — born July 28, 1847

Elizabeth Hornor, wife of John S. Hornor, died November 5, 1873 and was buried in Evergreen Cemetery, at Helena, Ark.⁷

Isaac Hornor, son of Isaac and Eleanor Boune Hornor,⁸ was married to Mary Potts, at Trenton, New Jersey, in 1757. He was ancestor of that branch of the Hornor family that went to Canada, one of whom, Thomas Hornor,⁵ was a Member of Parliament there.

Benjamin Hornor, son of Isaac and Eleanor (Boune³) Hornor, was married to Rebecca Butcher in 1761. He was the ancestor of the Coates family, our relations, who now live in Philadelphia. They are still Quakers.

Of the children of John Hornor and Patty Richards Hornor, the descendents of their oldest son, John, have been mentioned and traced down to the preesnt time. The next of their children was Samuel, who married Julia Sanford. They lived some time in Culpepper County, Virginia, from there they moved to Richmond, Virginia, then to Kentucky, and afterwards to Helena, Arkansas. Their children were: Harriet, Ferdinand S., Elmira, Theodore C., Julia and Susan; all of whom married in Arkansas, and it is believed died in the same State. The descendents of Theodore C. Hornor are living at this time in the southeastern part of the State of Arkansas.

The next was Mary Leonard Hornor, who married a man by the name of Carpenter in Virginia, and soon after moved to the State of Tennessee, where it is supposed they lived and died, but we have no record of them or their descendents.

Amelia R. married John Sanford in Culpepper county, Virginia, where they lived many years and then moved to Helena, Arkansas, where she died and was buried, and some of her descendents still live at Helena, among whom is our kinsman Judge James M. Hanks. Subsequent to the death of Amelia R., her husband, John Sanford, and two of their sons moved to Jackson county, Texas, where the said John Sanford died, but his two sons, with their families, still live in that section of country.

William B. R. Hornor, when quite a young man, went South and married a Widow Carpenter with one child, a daughter. The maiden name of his wife was Elizabeth Dunn. Some years after marriage they settled at Helena, Arkansas, where the said William B. R. attained some distinction as a lawyer. He was a member of the Legislature from Phillips county and also a judge of the court. They raised four children, to-wit: Patsey, Sidnah, Harriet and William Dunn, all of whom are dead and but one of their

descendants remaining at Helena, Edward C. Hornor, a grandson. Our relations — the Wherrys, of St. Louis — are also descendents of this family.

Mariah married quite young a man by the name of Briscoe and moved to Kentucky. They had some children, and her husband having died she afterwards married a man by the name of Edmond Terrill, who, on one occasion after his marriage, visited the relatives that were then living in Culpepper county, Virginia, but since that time we have had no definite account of that family.

James Yard Hornor, the youngest of the children of John and Patty Richards Hornor, married Dolly Ferguson in Culpepper county, Virginia, but soon after moved to Harrison county, now in West Virginia. They had six children. His wife died and a few years afterwards he married a second wife, Mary Robinson, in Harrison county. By his second marriage there were six children, and most of the descendents of James Y. Hornor now live in Clarksburg and Parkersburg, West Virginia. The oldest son of James Y. Hornor, whose name was John William Hornor, was a lawyer of some distinction, edited a newspaper in Parkersburg, was a member of the Legislature and died in August 1877, at his home near Parkersburg, West Virginia.

Ferdinand Y. Hornor, the youngest son of James Y. Hornor by his first marriage, lives in Clarksburg, has a family and is a very respectable man. All the children of the second marriage live in Clarksburg except the youngest son, who lives in the country some six or eight miles from town.

Of the children of John Hornor and Judith M. Roy, the oldest son, John S. Hornor, who married Elizabeth Johnson, and his family, living at Helena, Arkansas, have been traced down to the present time. All the rest, except the two who died in 1815, married and settled in Harrison county, now West Virginia, and all except Patsey still reside in West Virginia in the Counties of Harrison and Lewis. Patsey,

the youngest, died May 9, 1860, leaving no descendants except two grandchildren.

The oldest daughter, Catherine M.R., was twice married and raised three daughters, all of whom married and raised families. The youngest of the three daughters is now dead.

Two of the sons, Thomas A. Hornor and William A. Hornor, both raised large families of sons and daughters, most of whom are married and settled in the Counties of Harrison and Lewis aforesaid.

Robert Seymour Hornor married Julia Hall, a near relative of the Jackson family, some of whom were prominent in the late war. They (Robert Seymour and Julia) live in Lewis county but have no children.

John, who came over in 1683 as before stated was an intimate friend of William Penn and was also a Quaker, and all our ancestors were Quakers until our great grandfather, Samuel Hornor⁶ became an officer in the British army, when he had to change his religion and joined the Episcopal church, and his immediate descendants were all Episcopalians. One of our ancestors, or rather one of the same Hornor family, was one of the founders of Princeton College. He gave largely of his own means, and did much to induce others to give. Of the ten children who came over with John in 1683, we have no record of any but John, who died childless, and of Isaac, who married Eleanor Boune;⁸ there is a tradition that one of them settled in Virginia and spelled his name "Horner." We suppose this one was the ancestor of Inman Horner, of Fauquier county, Virginia, and of Gov. John S. Horner, of Wisconsin, formerly of Fauquier county, Virginia.

That part of the foregoing historical sketch which dates prior to the marriage of John Hornor to Patty Richards, at Falmouth, Virginia in 1777, was obtained from our relatives at Philadelphia in the fall of 1877, and the re-

mainder added by the writer, John S. Hornor, of Helena, Arkansas, in January, 1878, from his own personal knowledge together with information which he derived from his father, John the fifth, and from his grandfather, John, the fourth of that name.

HELENA, ARKANSAS, January 1878.

Since the foregoing was written another death has occurred in the family, to-wit: Thomas A. Hornor, a brother of the writer, who died at his home in Harrison County, West Virginia, on the 12th day of March 1878.

The foregoing is a geneological sketch of the Hornor family, but as nothing has been said of my mother's or grandmother's family, I will here state for the benefit of my children and grandchildren what little I know of the same:

My Grandmother Hornor, nee Patty Richards, who married my grandfather, John Hornor, at Falmouth, Virginia, was the oldest daughter of one of the most respectable families in Eastern Virginia. She had one brother and several sisters. I never knew her brother, but was slightly acquainted with some of his children. One sister married a man by the name of Triplett, with whom I had no acquaintance. Two of them lived in Fredericksburg, Virginia; one was married to a man by the name of Stone, and the other to a man by the name of Graham. Both of these families I have visited frequently. The youngest sister married Gen. Moses Green and lived in Culpepper county, Virginia, at whose house I was a frequent visitor, and on one occasion when a boy spent two weeks there. They were all people of wealth and distinction in society.

My mother, Judith M. Hornor, nee Judith M. Roy, was born and raised in Fauquier county, Virginia. She also was well connected. My grandfather and grandmother Roy both died before my recollection, and I had but little acquaintance with any of my mother's near relatives, except

her two brothers and one sister. Her youngest brother, Seymour H. Roy, went into the army when a young man, and was killed at the Battle of Chippewa, in the war of 1812, when I was a very small boy. Her other brother, Beverly Roy, lived to be an old man and died in Harrison County, now West Virginia. I was intimately acquainted with him from my boyhood until the time of his death. The sister married a man by the name of Lurty, and lived in King George County, Virginia, until the death of her husband. She then moved with her family to Culpepper County, and afterwards moved with my father's family to Harrison County, now West Virginia. She died at Clarksburg, West Va., many years ago, and some of her descendents still live in Harrison County, West Virginia. As stated, my mother's family was well connected. She was related to the Taliaferro's, Hooe's, Washington's and others, of Eastern Virginia, and on one occasion, a cousin, Beverly Lurty, a springhtly man, who had made the personal acquaintance of several of the relatives in Eastern Virginia, remarked to me with some emphasis, that on our mother's side, we were descended from the best blood of Virginia.

I do not know that I ought to write anything more, but perhaps it may be pardonable in me to add, that my immediate ancestors though starting in life under very favorable circumstances, through misfortunes and other causes, became somewhat reduced in their financial condition, though always had a good living, being the owners of some lands and slaves, until their death; and from my early boyhood, I felt a degree of family pride that produced a determination on my part to try and regain something in the way of position and property that had been lost. My humble efforts have been crowned with ordinary success only, but sufficient I hope to stimulate my descendants, in the fear of God, and with His blessing, to continue to strive in the same

direction, until they shall have obtained all the eminence and prosperity that human ambition ought to desire.

THE HORNOR FAMILY IN ARKANSAS

One hundred and twenty-eight years after the Quaker immigrant, John Hornor, established his home in New Jersey, William B. R. Hornor left Virginia for the vast new lands west of the Mississippi River. The time was 1811, just eight years after President Thomas Jefferson, by a master stroke of geopolitics, and some disregard for the restraints of the Constitution, added to the young Republic the huge territory known as The Louisiana Purchase. The spot which William B. R. Hornor chose to settle in this great new acquisition was on the west bank of the Mississippi River a few miles below the mouth of the St. Francis River. When the State of Arkansas was later carved out of the new property, the spot became known as Helena, Arkansas.

Since that time one hundred and forty-nine years have slipped by and a small community east of the Mississippi has expanded to the Pacific Ocean and became a nation of some one hundred and seventy-odd million souls residing in fifty states, comprising the most powerful nation in the world.

It may be startling to realize that in point of time William B. R. Hornor, when he moved to Arkansas, was closer by more than two decades to his Quaker immigrant ancestor than to those Hornors now living in the spot where he chose to settle.

Although he was not the direct ancestor of any of the Hornors who follow in this outline, he was responsible for their being in Arkansas.

The progenitors of the Hornors living in Arkansas left Virginia twenty-five years after William B. R. Hornor's departure, or 1836. It was then that John Sidney and Elizabeth Hornor, their two oldest sons, and a baby daughter set out from or near Clarksburg, Va., (now West Virginia), with the intention of establishing a new home

somewhere in the new lands which had drawn their uncle William B. R. Hornor from his home in Virginia. According to a story current in the family years ago, their goal in this new land was the city of New Orleans, then, as now, a thriving port.

The knowledge of the exact route of this journey is probably lost in the past, but it is certain that most of it was made by boat. However, it is known that while enroute they stopped at Morgantown, Va. (now West Va.) for several months where John S. Hornor taught school in order to add funds for the balance of the trip. Because of an epidemic of cholera near Cairo, Ill., St. Louis was quarantined against travelers passing thru Cairo, accordingly the young couple continued their journey down the river to Helena, Arkansas where William B. R. Hornor had settled some years before. An outbreak of yellow fever or cholera in New Orleans delayed their departure from Helena for so long that John Sidney began teaching school and the journey to New Orleans was never completed.

Thus chance upsets plans and affects the lives of generations that follow.

After teaching school for a few years John S. was elected County Clerk. Official record books of Phillip County show that on November 12th, 1836, (Deed Book "D", Page 292) John S. Hornor was Deputy Clerk under John R. Sanford, and in December, 1838, (Deed Book "E", Page 298) he was Clerk. At that time, the County Clerk evidently fulfilled the duties now filled by a County and Probate Clerk, Circuit and Chancery Clerk and Ex-Officio Recorder. Also in official record books we find that in September, 1819, William B. R. Hornor was a Justice of the Peace, for the County of Arkansas, Territory of Arkansas (Deed Book "A", Page 169), on November 19th, 1820, was one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the County

of Phillips, Territory of Arkansas (Deed Book "A", page 10), and in 1821, 1822, and 1823 (Deed Book "A", page 207), Probate Record Book "I", page 9, and Probate Record Book 2, page 31) was deputy clerk under Sylvanus Phillips.

Recorded in Probate Record Book "2", page 284, appears the affidavit of Macky M. Wherry, dated May 28th, 1838, stating that William B. R. Hornor died intestate, leaving the following heirs: Elizabeth Hornor, his wife, and three children, Sydna Elizabeth, the wife of said Macky M. Wherry, and William D. Hornor, both residents of Phillips County, and Amelia Harriet, the wife of Joseph A. Wherry, residents of the City of St. Louis. Macky M. Wherry was appointed administrator of his estate on the same date, and furnished bond in the amount of \$20,000.00, with the following sureties: Benjamin F. Odle, Jno. R. Sanford, N. Rightor, F. Hanks, Chas. Percy Smith, Jno. Preston, Jr., and Silas Drewry. All of these proceedings are before John R. Sanford, Clerk, by Jno. S. Hornor, Deputy Clerk.

It was, then, in December, 1838, after his uncle Wm. B. R. Hornor's death, that John S. Hornor was elected County Clerk. In this office he gained a knowledge of real estate conditions in the county which proved of value when he became active in the real estate business himself. The rapid development of lands west of the river caught the interest of persons in the east with funds for investment, and as an agent John S. Hornor was associated with a number of such investors. As a result of his activities in real estate, he was frequently called on to act in a fiduciary capacity. He prospered in a better than average manner and at the outbreak of the war owned substantial farming property and a sufficient number of slaves for its cultivation.

Helena's position on the Mississippi River exposed its inhabitants to the military activities accompanying

the struggle for possession of that vital waterway. To insure the safety of the women and children of the family, John S. took them by Wagon to Texas, where they remained until hostilities ceased. The slaves accompanied the family.

Like all southern families the Hornors faced the confusion and destitution which was the aftermath of the war. One circumstance, however, did intervene to mitigate the misfortunes which seemed inevitable. This occurrence was purely accidental. It happened that one of the Federal officers in charge of troops in Helena was named Horner and heard of the family of similar name. On meeting John S. he inquired if anything could be done to ease the family's plight. In reply John S. requested that the homes then in use as living quarters for the Federal officers be released. Thru the intervention of his father, also John S. Horner, then Governor of Wisconsin, this officer was able to have all properties returned to the family. Whether the Governor of Wisconsin was related isn't known.

Slowly the conditions improved until in 1875 John S. was able to enlarge his fiduciary work by the opening with his son, Sidney Henry, of the banking firm of John S. Hornor & Son. This activity he pursued until his death.

It should be of interest to the descendants of the couple, John Sidney and Elizabeth Johnson, to know that the family trees of both have roots in the earliest colonial soil. John S. thru Eleanor Bowne, who married a son, Isaac, of the original Quaker immigrant John Hornor, is directly descended from Elizabeth Fownes Winthrop Feake Hallett. This lady was the niece and daughter-in-law of John Winthrop, first governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. She was also the principal character in the historical novel "The Winthrop Woman" by Anya Seton.

Also, on her side Elizabeth Johnson Hornor, thru her father Joseph S. Johnson, Governor of Virginia and representative in Congress for a number of terms, is descended from Roger Wolcott, Governor of Connecticut 1679-1707.

The descendants of this couple are given in the outline which follows:

John Sidney Hornor (1), son of John & Judith Roy Hornor was born in Fauquier County, Virginia, Aug. 24, 1806, and died Nov. 5, 1890 at Helena, Arkansas. He married Oct. 1, 1829 Elizabeth Johnson, daughter of Governor Joseph S. and Sallie Johnson, who was born at Bridgeport, Virginia (now West Virginia) July 13, 1808 and died Nov. 6, 1873 at Helena, Arkansas. Their children were Albert Aurelius (2), John Joseph (3), Virginia (4), Mary (5), Hamilton Seymour (6), Sidney Henry (7), and Walter (8).

Albert Aurelius Hornor (2), son of John S. (1), was born in Fauquier County, Virginia, Mar. 6, 1831, and died at Helena, Arkansas Feb. 20, 1912. He was a bachelor. After his graduation from the University of Pennsylvania in Medicine, he returned to Helena and spent a long and useful life in the practice of his profession. He served as a surgeon in the Army of the Confederacy, with the rank of Major. He was active in both the Medical Society of Phillips County and of the State of Arkansas, serving as the third president of the Arkansas Medical Society (1878-1879) and was undoubtedly one of its members when it was chartered in 1875.

John Joseph Hornor (3), son of John S. (1), was born in Fauquier County, Virginia, Mar. 21, 1833 and died at Helena, Arkansas Feb. 6, 1905. He was married three times: first, to Betty Tully of Columbia, Tennessee; their children were Virginia (9), Betty (10), and Edward Chaffin (11): second, to Mrs. Mary E. Bruce of New York

City, who lived only a few weeks after the marriage; and, third, to Mary Lyford, of Newburyport, Massachusetts, born July 30, 1853, and died at Helena, Arkansas Feb. 7, 1942. Their children were: John Lyford (12), Joseph Albert (13), Harriet (14), Mary (15), James Tappan (16). After his graduation from Jackson College of Columbia, Tennessee, John J. Hornor read law under Hon. Wm. K. Sebastian, for many years U. S. Senator from Arkansas. Before the outbreak of the Civil War he formed a law partnership with General James C. Tappan, which was later dissolved when he formed the law partnership with his son, E. C. Hornor. John J. Hornor was licensed to practice in the Supreme Court of the U. S. and won a number of cases before this court. In 1874 he was chosen as a member of the Constitutional Convention, which framed the present Constitution. While his primary interest was the law, he was also active in many phases of the business of eastern Arkansas. Following the Civil War, he became associated with Mr. A. H. Johnson, who purchased at auction the assets of the defunct and uncompleted railroad between Helena and Clarendon. In payment for fifteen years of legal work and the handling of the litigation necessary to convert a defunct property into a going concern John J. Hornor received a substantial interest in the property. The railroad proved to be highly successful and was later sold to the Gould interests. He also played an important part in the building of such enterprises as the gas and electric plant and the formation of a company to manufacture artificial ice. His last years were spent as president of the Bank of Helena, which was founded by his father. As a Major he served in the Army of the Confederacy. After the war he was active in the affairs of the United Confederate Veterans, serving at one time as Commander of the Arkansas Division. -

As an Episcopalian, he took a keen interest in the affairs of the Church.

Virginia Hornor (4), daughter of John S. (1), was born Mar. 27, 1835 in Virginia, and died in Helena, Ark., Aug. 14, 1837.

Mary Hornor (5), daughter of John S. (1), was born Aug. 20, 1838, at Helena, Arkansas, and died in San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 29, 1925. She was married to Peter Oscar Thweatt. Of six children born to this marriage only three survived childhood. Elizabeth (Thweatt) Charlot, 1877-1902; Aurelia Thweatt, 1883-1902, Oscar Thweatt, 1880-1924. Mary Hornor Thweatt survived her husband and all of her children. They all died without issue. Mary Hornor Thweatt accepted an invitation to join the National Society of Colonial Dames of America. She gave as her colonial ancestor, Robert Feake of Massachusetts and Connecticut.

Hamilton Seymour Hornor (6), son of John S. (1), was born in Helena, Arkansas, July 22, 1844, and died there Sept. 2, 1915. He married Caroline Polk of Helena, Arkansas, who was born Sept. 7, 1853 and died at Helena, Arkansas, July 3, 1924. Their children were: John Sidney II (17), and Mimi (18). The war interrupted the schooling of Hamilton Seymour and in the confused and straitened conditions which followed that conflict it was necessary for him to forego further schooling and earn a living. His business life was spent in mercantile pursuits; first, as a partner in McKenzie, Hornor & Co. Later, his business, known as H. S. Hornor and Co., engaged in the supplying of groceries and dry goods to farm personnel in the area.

Sidney Henry Hornor (7), son of John S. (1) was born at Helena, Arkansas, July 28, 1847 and died there Nov. 18, 1900. On Oct. 20, 1880 he married Betty Mosby at Lucerne near Somerville, Tennessee. Betty Mosby was born Feb. 8, 1858 and died Nov. 21, 1915. Their children were: Joseph Mosby (19), Elisabeth (20), Albert

Aurelius (21), Sidney Henry Jr. (22), Louis Hamilton (23) Cornelia (24), and Josephine Eyster (25). Sidney Henry Hornor though but a youth, managed the wagons and slaves on the families' trek to and from Arkansas and Texas, while his father with the women and children went by horseback and in vehicles. He served the last six months of the Civil War in the Quartermaster Office of the Confederate Army in Arkansas. He was a partner in the firm of McKenzie, Hornor & Co. This partnership on being dissolved, became H. S. and S. H. Hornor. In turn, this partnership was soon dissolved when S. H. Hornor went into partnership with his father in the banking enterprise known as John S. Hornor and Son in 1875. In 1890, before the death of John S. Hornor, this banking firm was succeeded by a corporation known as the Bank of Helena. Sidney H. Hornor was known as the director and manager but his title was "Cashier" until his death, ten years later. He was also associated, as a partner, with A. H. Johnson and John J. Hornor in the ownership of the Arkansas Midland Railroad. Like his father and mother, he was an active member of the Methodist Church.

Walter Johnson Hornor (8), son of John S. (1), was born at Helena, Arkansas, Mar. 23, 1853, and died there Sept. 4, 1859.

Virginia Hornor (9), daughter of John J. (3), was born at Helena, Arkansas Jan. 9, 1858, and died there Feb. 2, 1947. She married Jordan Bennett Lambert, and their children were: Joseph Hornor, Virginia, Jordan Bennett, Jr., and Betty Updegraff.

Virginia Hornor Lambert spent her entire life in Helena, Arkansas. She attended a small private school and entered Vassar College at the age of 16. After her marriage to Jordan Bennett Lambert, in addition to being a devoted mother, she found time to take an active part in all civic organizations. She was a devout mem-

ber of St. John's Episcopal Church, working untiringly in all branches of its support. Mrs. Lambert was an enthusiastic and loyal member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and, with a group of its members, raised money to purchase and erect a beautiful monument in the Confederate cemetery at Helena. During World War I she dedicated her time and talent to selling Liberty Bonds all over the county. She was also in charge of a sewing room. She was a member of the Daughters of 1812 and The James Bate Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, serving a term as the Chapter Regent. Mrs. Lambert spent the latter years of her life in the home of her daughter, Mrs. T. E. Wooten, where she died at the age of 89, loved and respected by all who knew her. (The descendants of Virginia Hornor (9) are brought down to date in a section which follows.)

Betty Salina Hornor (10), daughter of John J. (3), was born at Helena, Arkansas, Jan. 11, 1860, and died at La Feria, Texas, December 28, 1952. She was married to George Taylor Updegraff on Nov. 20, 1884, who was born at Mt. Pleasant, Ohio, on July 24, 1857, and died at La Feria, Texas, on Oct. 18, 1932. It is interesting to note that he was a Quaker, as was the immigrant John Hornor. Their children were Edward Evans, born at Helena, Arkansas, Oct. 25, 1886, and died there Mar. 18, 1892; George Taylor born at Helena, Ark., May 13, 1891, and died there Jan. 1, 1893; Elsie Worthington, born at Helena, Ark., Dec. 3, 1888, and died in Corpus Christi, Texas, on July 11, 1953; Elsie being their only child to survive childhood. (The descendants of Betty Hornor (10) are brought down to date in a section which follows.)

Edward Chaffin Hornor (11), son of John J. (3) was born at Helena, Arkansas, on Nov. 5, 1861, and died there on Feb. 18, 1944. He was married twice. First,

to Leonora Pointer of Memphis, Tennessee. Their children were Aurelius Pointer (26), Edward Tully (27), George Lambert (28), and Leonora Harriet (29). Second, to Pauline Cisco of Little Rock, Arkansas. There were no children of this marriage. Edward C. Hornor attended Locust Dale Academy near Rapidan, Virginia, and the University of Virginia. After returning to Helena from the University of Virginia, he worked for his grandfather, John S. Hornor (1), in the banking business. Later he attended Law School at the University of Virginia and subsequently was admitted to the Arkansas Bar. A clipping of indecipherable date concerning E. C. Hornor's early days as a lawyer was found in Mary Hornor Thweatt's scrap book which reads as follows: "A great many who heard Mr. E. C. Hornor's speech to the jury in the Crosby Case say that if he can make a speech like that the first time he addresses a jury in a murder case, he will be a hard man to down after he has had more experience in that line of practice. We have been informed that this was Mr. Hornor's first speech in an important criminal case.

The law partnership with his father, known as "John J. and E. C. Hornor," enjoyed a fine reputation and was expanding rapidly until the death of his uncle Sidney H. prompted him to abandon the practice of law and join his father, John J., in the management of the affairs of the Bank of Helena as cashier. He continued in this position until his father's death in 1905, when he became president, which position he held until the bank ceased operation in 1913.

Edward C. Hornor served as president of the Businessmen's League, and its succeeding organization, the Chamber of Commerce, for many years. His interest in business was wide and ranged from real estate through railroading to various types of manufacturing. Underlying this pre-occupation with business enterprises was

his desire to stimulate and expand the commercial development of the community. It was this desire of his which prompted him and his cousin, John S. Hornor II (17), to form the partnership of E. C. and John S. Hornor, which conceived and built the City of West Helena. This project involved the building of many houses, an electric railway, water and sewer system.

The closure of the Bank of Helena proved a severe set-back to his business career for a number of years and all his available assets were spent to protect the interests of those whose money was involved in the closure. As this matter reached a satisfactory conclusion, his ever present interest in community expansion reasserted itself, and he devoted years of effort in an attempt to get a bridge built across the Mississippi River. Though his efforts failed at that time, thirty odd years later the bridge he envisaged is being built.

In 1917 Edward C. Hornor was elected to the Constitutional Convention called to write a new Constitution to replace the one which his father, John J., had helped to write in 1874.

During the great depression of the 1930's he served as Public Works Administrator for the State of Arkansas, and in the latter years of his life he acted as Master of Chancery, and in conjunction with his daughter developed a set of Abstract Books covering Phillips County.

He was a man of great energy and wide interests.

John Lyford Hornor (12), son of John J. (3), was born at Brooklyn, N. Y., on June 28, 1877. He married Dorothy Bibb of Fayetteville, Arkansas. There were two children, John Lyford, Jr., (30), and Thomas Humphreys (31).

He graduated from the University of Arkansas and for a period studied law. He was manager of the Helena Gas Company for some time, but later entered the

electrical supply business. Subsequently, he and his family moved to Washington, D. C., where he was for many years a Referee for the Federal Trade Commission.

Joseph Albert Hornor (13), son of John J. (3), was born at Helena, Arkansas, on Nov. 23, 1878, and died there Mar. 21, 1956. He married Rosa Mays of Mississippi. They had one son, Joseph Albert, Jr., (32). He attended St. Albans School and the University of Arkansas. He spent most of his business life as a partner in the Helena Hardware Company.

Harriet Hornor (14), daughter of John J. (3), was born at Helena, Arkansas, Dec. 25, 1879, and died there on Jan. 17, 1956. She attended Hollins Institute in Hollins, Virginia, and then married Jamie D. Mays. Their children: Mary, Harriet Virginia, Jamie Deavourx, Jr., who was born Aug. 23, 1910, and died April 21, 1950, a bachelor, and Roberta. (The descendants of Harriet Hornor (14) are brought down to date in a section which follows).

Mary Hornor (15), daughter of John J. (3), was born at Helena, Arkansas, on Sept. 6, 1881. After attending Hollins Institute in Hollins, Virginia, she married Charles Lawson Moore, Jr. They had one son, Charles Lawson Moore, III. Mrs. Moore is still living and now resides at 1011 Perry Street, Helena. (The descendants of Mary Hornor, (15) are brought down to date in a section which follows.)

James Tappan Hornor (16), son of John J. (3), was born at Helena, Arkansas, on Dec. 17, 1885, and died there on June 17, 1957. He married Lelia Dunn of Monticello, Arkansas, in 1911. Their children were Lelia Charlotte (33), James Tappan, Jr. (34), John Joseph II, (35), Mary (36) and Lawson (37), twins. Mary Hornor (36), twin daughter of James Tappan (16), was born Mar. 11, 1923, and was killed in a horseback ac-

cident at Helena, Arkansas on Feb. 19, 1943. She was unmarried.

James Tappan Hornor graduated from the University of Virginia. He returned to Helena and after a few years entered business as a distributor of petroleum products. During his later years he was Mayor of the City of Helena and had just been re-elected to this post shortly before his death. He was very active in the affairs of the Episcopal Church.

John Sidney Hornor II (17), son of Hamilton S. (6), was born in Helena, Arkansas, on Dec. 14, 1873, and died there on April 14, 1934. He married Fannie May Moore. Their children were Robert Moore (38) and Carolyn (39).

John Sidney Hornor II after graduation from Virginia Military Institute returned to Helena, and following a short association in business with his father, he formed a partnership with Charles A. Wooten in the cotton brokerage business. This partnership was very successful and was continued until his duties as cashier of the Bank of Helena, which he assumed on the death of John Joseph Hornor (3) in 1905, required his full energies. Later, in partnership with his cousin E. C. Hornor (11), he was engaged in the building of the City of West Helena. It was through this partnership that he and his cousin aided so importantly in the settlement of the affairs following the closure of the Bank of Helena.

John Sidney II was a tireless worker and endowed with great patience and perseverance.

Mimi Hornor (18), daughter of Hamilton Seymour (6), was born at Helena, Arkansas, on Feb. 1, 1879, and died in Ohio, Mar. 28, 1936. She was twice married, first to William Pillow, and second, to Walter Wright. There were no children.

Joseph Mosby Hornor (19), son of Sidney Henry Hornor (7) was born in Fayette County, Tenn., Aug. 21, 1881, is still a bachelor, living in San Antonio, Texas, with his sister.

Elisabeth Hornor (20), daughter of Sidney Henry (7) was born at Helena, Arkansas, April 22, 1884, is also still unmarried. Elizabeth Hornor accepted an invitation to join the National Society of Colonial Dames of America, naming as her colonial ancestor, Capt. Samuel Hornor of New Jersey.

Albert Aurelius Hornor II (21), son of Sidney Henry Hornor (7), was born at Helena, Arkansas, Sept. 15, 1886. He married Virginia Farabough, on Oct. 18, 1924. They had two children, Anne Virginia (40), born February 8, 1927, and Josephine Elizabeth (41), born Nov. 28, 1929. Upon his graduation from the University of Virginia, he entered the Harvard Medical School. After his graduation there he became greatly interested in academic medicine, first of all, infectious diseases, later in diabetes. Taught at Harvard Medical School both before the First World War and between the First and Second World Wars. Served with the American Expeditionary Forces in the Medical Corps, rising to the rank of Major. Teaching positions at the Harvard Medical School have been in Medicine and in Tropical Medicine. In later years all of his time has been devoted to the practice of Internal Medicine in Boston. In addition to serving on several other hospital staffs, has, since 1941, to date, been Physician-in-Chief of the New England Baptist Hospital, where he has served as President of the Staff for two years. He has been a Trustee of the New England Baptist Hospital and a member of the Executive Committee of the New England Baptist Hospital; Chairman of the Boston Public Health Council from 1957 to date. Chief pleasure in life has been

in the practice of Internal Medicine. He practices in Boston, Mass. and resides in Brookline, Mass.

Sidney Henry Hornor, Jr. (22), son of Sidney Henry Hornor (7), was born at Helena, Ark. Feb. 20, 1890. Sidney Henry Hornor Jr. graduated from the Jacob Tome School, Port Deposit, Maryland in 1909. A.B. Degree, Princeton University 1913. Was drafted into the U.S. Army in November 1917; made a 2nd Lieutenant, Quartermaster Corps, July 1918; served in Finance Department of the Army of Occupation, in France, from July 1918 to discharge at Camp Dix, New Jersey, October 31, 1918. After 35 years association with the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of San Antonio, ten of which as Secretary - Treasurer, Sidney Henry now lives in retirement with his brother and sister in San Antonio, Texas. He is a bachelor.

Louis Hamilton Hornor (23), son of Sidney Henry Hornor (7), was born at Helena, Ark. Apr. 8, 1892. He married Virginia Lamar, on June 9, 1921. They have two children, Louis Hamilton, Jr. (42), and Virginia Lamar (43). They live in San Antonio, Texas.

Mary Cornelia Hornor (24), daughter of Sidney Henry Hornor (7), was born at Helena, Ark., Feb. 3, 1895. She married Joseph Sayers Farmer, who died Sept. 9, 1959. They had three children, Elizabeth Mosby Farmer, Josephine Hornor Farmer, and Margaret Hardy Farmer. Mary Cornelia Farmer still lives in or near San Antonio, Texas. (The descendants of Mary Cornelia (24) are brought down to date in a section which follows.)

Josephine Eyster Hornor (25), daughter of Sidney Henry (7), was born at Helena, Ark., on Mar. 25, 1899. She lived with her brother and sister in San Antonio, Texas, until her death on July 5, 1927. She was unmarried.

Aurelius Pointer Hornor (26), son of Edward C. (11), was born at Helena, Arkansas Nov. 17, 1889. He married Evelyn Baker Short, also of Helena, Oct. 15, 1912. Their children are Aurelius Pointer, Jr. (44), William Edward, (45), Sarah Short (46), Carroll Godfrey (47).

Aurelius Pointer Hornor attended Woodberry Forest School, Orange, Va., and was graduated from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1912. He was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant in 1918 and served briefly in the Heavy Artillery in World War I. After a few years association in business with his father, he made several moves and finally joined Thos. A. Edison, Inc. of West Orange, N. J. On his retirement he was a Vice President and Division Manager of that company. He lives in retirement at Carlisle, Pa.

Edward Tully Hornor (27), son of Edward C. (11) was born at Helena, Arkansas, Aug. 18, 1893 and married Hattie Wayne West also of Helena. Their children are Edward Tully, Jr. (48) and Elmer West (49).

Edward Tully Hornor attended Woodberry Forest School at Orange, Virginia. His early business experience was in association with his father. Later he formed a partnership with his father-in-law, Elmer West, which led to the founding of the company known as The West - Hornor Motor Co. This company is the outlet for General Motors automobiles, principally the Chevrolet, in the county.

Edward Tully was one of the early Mayors of the newly incorporated city of West Helena. He was one of the prime movers and an original stockholder of the Helena National Bank. At the present time he is Chairman of the Board of that institution.

For years he and his younger brother engaged in extensive farming operations in the county. This partnership was dissolved when his brother's health failed

and he now carries the farming project on as an individually owned and managed venture. He lives at West Helena.

George Lambert Hornor (28) son of Edward C. (11), was born at Helena, Arkansas Jan. 29, 1896, and died at West Helena, Ark. Apr. 12, 1960. He was a bachelor and lived with his sister, Leonora Harriet (29) at West Helena.

He attended school at Woodberry Forest School in Virginia. Like his older brothers his early business experience was gained in association with his father. Later he purchased and operated the interurban electric railway which connected Helena and West Helena. He replaced the electric railway with busses which he operated as a partnership with his sister and nephew. Ill health made it necessary for him to retire from active business life a number of year before his death.

Leonora Harriet Hornor (29), daughter of Edward C. (11), was born at Helena Dec. 18, 1901 and married Walter Luther Morris Dec. 2, 1920. There were two children: Walter Luther, Jr. and Edwynne.

Leonora Harriet attended school at Stuart Hall, Staunton, Virginia. She collaborated with her father in the last years of his life in the production of a set of abstract books for the county and with him established the Hornor-Morris Abstract Co., which she operates today. She is also associated with her son in other real estate and business ventures. (The decendant of Leonora Harriet (29) are brought down to date in a section which follows.)

John Lyford Hornor Jr. (30), son of John Lyford (12) was born Feb. 9, 1908 in New York City. He married first to Betsy Richards on Sept. 2, 1929 by whom he had two children, John Lyford III (50) and Thomas Richards (51). On June 23, 1950 he married Ann Eid-

son, to whom one daughter, Lou Bayly (52) was born March 30, 1955, at Okinawa, The Ryukus. He graduated from the Military Academy at West Point and holds the rank of Colonel in the Army.

Thomas Humphreys Hornor (31), son of John Lyford (12) was born in New York City on June 30, 1911. He married Helen Virginia Saks. Helen Anne (53) is the only child of this marriage. He resides in Towson, Md.

Joseph Albert Hornor, Jr. (32), son of Joseph Albert (13) was born at Helena, Arkansas in 1912 and died Feb. 22, 1960 in Greenville, Miss. He married Evelyn Watwood. There are two children, Martha Sherrill (54) and Joseph Albert III (55). His family resides in Greenville, Mississippi.

Lelia Charlotte Hornor (33), daughter of James Tappan (16) was born at Helena June 14, 1912 and married Zack David Jennings. Their children are Lelia Charlotte, Roberta Harvey, Mary Hornor, Zack David, Jr., Tappan Hornor. Lelia Hornor Jennings is a member of the National Society of Colonial Dames of America by reason of her descent from Capt. Samuel Hornor. She lives in Millington, Tenn.

James Tappan Hornor, Jr. (34) son of James Tappan (16) was born at Helena, Oct. 22, 1913. He married Sue Campbell of Little Rock, Arkansas. Their children are Mary Sue (56), Laura Pemberton (57), Margaret Campbell (58). He is a graduate of the University of Arkansas in law. In World War II, he served as a major in the Army. He lives in Little Rock, Ark.

John Joseph Hornor II, (35), son of James Tappan (16) was born at Helena, Mar. 22, 1918. He married Mary Elizabeth Good. Their children are Georgia (59), John Joseph III (60) Mary Good (61) and Lawson Hart-

sell (62). He was graduated from the University of Arkansas. In World War II he served in the Army attaining the rank of Captain. He lives in Helena.

Lawson Dunn Hornor (37), son of James Tappan (16) was born at Helena, Ark. Mar. 11, 1923. He attended the University of Arkansas. In the Korean War he served in the Navy as a Lieutenant. He is not married and lives with his mother in Helena.

Lawson Dunn and his brother, John J. II, are in partnership as distributors of oil and gasoline in Helena.

Robert Moore Hornor (38), son of John Sidney II (17) was born at Helena Nov. 27, 1900. He married Oct. 7, 1924, Marguerite Nicholls. Their children are Nina Marguerite (63) and Robert Moore, Jr. (64). Robert Moore lives in Helena and is engaged in extensive farming operations.

Edwin Hornor of Helena, Arkansas born there in 1860 married Miss Morton of Tenn. had 2-children, Morton and William. Edwin was son of William Dunn Hornor of Helena, Ark. who was born there July 26, 1825, died in 1861, in Confederate Army, and was seen last in battle. EEdicated at St. Louis University, lived in St. Louis, Mo., 1839-1844, married Ann Eliza Reynolds. William Dunn Hornor was son of William Bird Richards Hornor of Helena, Ark. born in Virginia, Feb. 28, 1787, died in Helena, May 1, 1838, lawyer, judge, raised a company and commanded it in battle of New Orleans — member of Arkansas House of Representatives 1820-1823, married Nov. 3, 1811, Elizabeth Dunn of Big Harper, Tenn. daughter of Joseph and Phoebe Dunn. Phoebe moved with her mother and family to Arkansas in 1800 descending the Mississippi River, and landed in Helena when there was not a house there. William Bird Richards Hornor was son of John Hornor of Fredericksburgh and Culpepper, Va. John was born in Trenton, N. J. Oct. 27, 1750 died in Culpepper March 19, 1819, inherited from his father the land on which Trenton now stands also a large tract of land at Cape May, lost his fortune during the Revolutionary

War, fitted out at his own expense a number of vessels, was afterward paid for them in Continental Money which became valueless. Merchant in Fredericksburgh, moved to Culpepper after the war, a fine linguist, speaking seven languages. An Episcopalian, changed the spelling of his name from Horner to or * married July 27, 1777 Patty daughter of John Richards and Susannah Coleman; vestryman of South Farnham Parish, Va. 1739-79. Justice of Stafford Co. Patty was granddaughter of Bird Richards of Drysdale, Va. and Robert S. Coleman of Virginia.

John Hornor was son of Samuel Hornor of Trenton, N. J. who was born in N. J. March 1, 1724, died in 1766. British officer was 1st of his family to become an Episcopalian. SUPPLEMENT

Joseph S. Johnson

In the section devoted to the "Hornor Family in Arkansas" little mention is made of Joseph S. Johnson except that his daughter, Elizabeth Johnson, was the wife of John S. Hornor (1). Because of his very long and useful life and his influence on more than one generation of his descendants, a brief account of his activities and his background may prove of interest to those who now look upon him as a remote ancestor.

Such an account came to me in 1958 from Dr. Albert A. Hornor of Brookline, Mass., who received it in turn from Mr. Thos. R. Hornor (no descendent of Joseph S. Johnson) of Charleston, W. Va. This brief biography and genealogical sketch, although undocumented so far as Thos. R. Hornor's source was concerned, was considered by him (Thos. R. Hornor) to be correct.

The article titled, "Governor Johnson in a Nutshell," is quoted in part below.

Aurelius P. Hornor

"GOVERNOR JOHNSON IN A NUTSHELL"

"Joseph Johnson, a representative from Virginia; born in Orange County, N. Y., December 19, 1785; moved with his mother to Bridgeport, Va. (now West Virginia) in 1800; acquired a knowledge of rudimentary studies by personal efforts; served in the War of 1812 as captain of a company of riflemen; member of the State House of Delegates 1815, 1816, 1818 — 1822, 1847 and 1848. Elected as a Democrat to Eighteenth and Nineteenth Congresses (March 4, 1823 — March 3, 1827); unsuccessful candidate to the Twentieth Congress, elected to the Twenty-second Congress to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Philip Daddridge, and served from January 21 to March 3, 1833; elected to the Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth Congresses (March 4, 1835 — March 3, 1841);

delegate to the Democratic National Convention at Baltimore in 1844; elected to the Twenty-ninth Congress March 4, 1845 — March 3, 1847; delegate to the Virginia Constitutional Convention of 1850 - 1851; Governor of Virginia 1852 - 1856; supported the Southern Confederacy; died in Bridgeport, West Virginia, February 27, 1877."

"Joseph Johnson of Bridgeport was a logical Governor for Virginia for his ancestors had a distinguished history in New England politics; three generations in one line having served as Governor of Connecticut.

"He was the great-grandson of Governor Roger Walcott* of Connecticut, 1679 - 1707, poet, statesman and historian, author of 'Journal of The Siege at Louisburg;' Governor of Connecticut under the Colonial government of England.

"Roger in his turn was the grandson of Henry Walcott, Sr., 1578 - 1655, who emigrated to New England and in 1628, only eight years after the landing of the Pilgrim fathers. Henry helped found Windsor, Connecticut in 1635; was in the first General Assembly of Connecticut in 1637 and House of Magistrates from 1643 until his death in 1655.

"Henry's son, Henry Jr., who died in 1680, was a patentee of the state of Connecticut in 1662. Henry's son, Simon died in 1687, leaving the eight year old Roger, whose noteworthy career has been mentioned.

"Roger's son, Oliver Walcott, Sr., was probably the most famous member of the family. He was born in 1726 and died in 1797. A signer of the Declaration of Independence; he was a Revolutionary general; a member of the Continental Congress from Connecticut. As Commissioner of Indian Affairs, he negotiated the treaty of Fort Stanwick in 1784 setting the boundary of the lands of the Six Nations, and in 1796 he became Governor of Connecticut, serving until his death in 1797. He was the great uncle of Governor Joseph Johnson.

*Where the name Walcott appears it should be spelled Wolcott

"Oliver Walcott, Jr., his son, succeeded Alexander Hamilton as Secretary of the Treasury in 1795, and was Governor of Connecticut from 1817 to 1827. His dates were b. 1760 — d. 1833. He was a first cousin of the Virginia Governor's mother.

"Governor Roger Walcott was the father also of Abigail, who married Silas Wright, an East India silk merchant and schooner captain.

"Abigail Walcott Wright had among other children, a daughter, Abigail, 1753 -1839, whose story reads like fiction. Family tradition has it that she was courted by Aaron Burr, but she married Joseph Johnson, Sr., and was disinherited by her Tory father.

(Both of the Oliver Walcotts and the elder Oliver's brother, Alexander Walcott, attended law school at Litchfield, Connecticut, where Aaron Burr also got his legal training).

"Joseph Johnson, Sr., father of Joseph Johnson (the Governor of Virginia) marched with Captain William Warner's company from Connecticut for the relief of Boston in the Lexington alarm in April 1775. Thereafter he served three enlistments from 1775 to 1781. He died in 1791 leaving his widow and five children.

"After living in New York and New Jersey for a few years Abigail Wright Johnson set out with her children for the newly settled regions of Virginia.

"Her daughter, Mary 1773 — 1867 married William Rice in Baltimore, Maryland and her son, Solomon, 1775-1804, married Catherine Stryden in the same town.

"Abigail Wright Johnson proceeded westward with the three younger children. In the party were Catherine Winter, a widow, with her children, and a Wid. Link, granddaughter of Lord Baltimore.

"Tradition has it that on the trail they came to a fork. There they set up a stick to determine by the direction it fell whether to go west to Pennsylvania and Ohio or south into Western Virginia. The falling of the stick led the way to

Bridgeport, already a thriving community when they reached it in 1801.

"Martha Johnson, second daughter and third child of Abigail Wright Johnson, was born 1783 and died 1863. Her pictures show that she was strikingly beautiful and she was a great belle during her stay in Baltimore. She married Matthias Winter, the son of the widow Catherine.

"Joseph Johnson, 1785-1877, was the fourth child and second son of Abigail and Joseph Johnson, Sr. He married Sarah Smith and was the father of thirteen children.

"William Johnson, 1791-1868, was the fifth child and third son of Abigail and Joseph Johnson, Sr. He first married Olive Waldo and many years later married Rebecca Wheeler. His two sets of children were a generation apart.

"With this background, statesmanship inherited from his mother and patriotism through his father, it is no wonder that Bridgeport produced a Governor for the State of Virginia.

"Bridgeport was a cultural center, a century ago. Some of Abigail's Walcott cousins visited her here as records in the Harrison County Courthouse will show.

"There was another cousin named Silas Wright for Abigail's father, and was either her nephew or her cousin who was born in 1795 and died 1847 who was Governor of the State of New York from 1844 to 1846."
